### **This is our story...**

Rivers West District for Sport, Culture & Recreation Inc. (Rivers West DSCR) was formed through the amalgamation of Battlefords Regional Recreation Association, Wild Goose Recreation Association, River Junction Recreation Association, and the Zone 7 Sport Council. The new District began operations on February 1<sup>st</sup>, 2009, and is a registered non-profit corporation governed by a volunteer Board of Directors.

The geographic area served by Rivers West District is located in *West Central* Saskatchewan and encompasses the area from Pierceland and Dorintosh in the north, south to the South Saskatchewan River, and from the Alberta Border in the west to Tessier, Hafford and Medstead in the east.

Rivers West District is one of 7 Sport, Culture & Recreation Districts in the Province which were formed through the Building Better Communities (BBC) initiative driven by SaskSport, SaskCulture, and Saskatchewan Parks and Recreation Association. These Districts are an integral part of the Sport, Culture & Recreation delivery system in the Province of Saskatchewan.

Rivers West District receives the bulk of its funding from revenue generated through the sale of lottery tickets in the province. The Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation administers the lottery ticket revenue and this money funds over 12,000 Sport, Culture and Recreation groups.

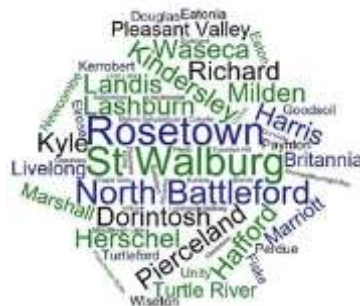

## 2020-2021 Programs & Services

**Indigenous Community Sport Grant Program (ICSGP)** - Indigenous Community Sport Program Grant (ICSPG) provides greater sport participation and development opportunities for Indigenous youth in Saskatchewan. Rivers West District adjudicated thirteen grants for a total of \$60,000. Funding is through SaskSport with grant dollars going to the development of volleyball, soccer, athletics, weightlifting, equine, disc golf, skating, archery, biathlon, and track. Due to COVID, applicants were only able to access funding for equipment. Some grants had to be returned because of shutdowns. We are now moving forward in the hopes that the grant money will support not only equipment but activities.

**Creative Kids** - Creative Kids is a charitable giving program designed to reduce social and financial barriers for children and youth who wish to participate in arts and cultural activities in Saskatchewan. In 2020, the Battlefords committee funded 50 of 54 applications, providing \$11,950 to the assist children and youth to access cultural activities in the community. Note that this number was down due to COVID, and the committee typically receives 75 applications per year. Rivers West District has two volunteer committees that help kids access culture on the west side of the province, one in North Battleford and one in Kindersley. Children and Youth in communities that do not fall under the umbrella of these two committees are able to access funding through the Provincial organization.

**SSFA 55+ Rivers West Committee** - The Saskatchewan Senior Fitness Association 55+ (SSFA) Rivers West District committee were unable to host any games this year. We did create new Bingo Activity Events, whereby those wishing to participate could access bingo cards through email requests, as well as being accessible on the Rivers West Website. Participants filled them out and mailed them back to the committee for a prize. It was very successful, and participants had a lot of fun completing the activities. These included walking, napping, visiting with a friend, reading, painting, drawing, and activities specific to the season. The Bingo cards each had a theme: October 2020 *Fall into Bingo*, December 2020 *Holiday Fun Bingo*, February 2021 *We Are All Sweethearts Bingo*, and April *Hop, Hop into Spring Bingo*. The Rivers West SSFA committee also participated in some Zoom learning experiences.

**Rivers West District Dream Broker (DDB) program** - The DDB Program targets children and youth who are faced with various social and economic challenges that adversely affect their quality of life. These issues create barriers to sport, culture, and recreation such as: economic circumstance, awareness, cultural insensitivity, and access to transportation. Children, youth, and their caregivers are given support to provide greater opportunities that contribute to developing children and youth who are healthy, active, successful members of their community.

This is where the DDB comes in. The DDB works directly with children, youth, and their families from Connaught & Saint Mary's school in North Battleford to reduce barriers to gain access to existing sport, culture, and recreation activities. Since the beginning of the 2020-2021 school year over 250 students have successfully completed a program or activity with the Dream Broker program. Because of the COVID-19 pandemic most sport, culture & recreation activities in the community were cancelled or changed to adhere to the new restrictions to reduce the spread of the virus. Also, as soon as the pandemic began, schools prohibited all in-school extra curricular activities. It became difficult to register students for activities, so the Dream Brokers throughout the Province worked together to create a plan to provide alternative programming for students. Activity



kits became the main source of programming for students. Thanks to the amazing cooperation of each school, students were able to work on their activity kits at school during class time.

### **DDB Schools - Connaught School & St. Mary's School**

#### **St. Mary School**

The Dream Broker has been working solely in St. Mary's school this year. Being in the school has helped the DDB get to know the St. Mary's staff & students much better. Although there were plans to begin after school clubs in Fall 2020, due to restrictions, they were not allowed to go ahead. We are hoping to start after school clubs in Fall 2021. The DDB was allowed to work with classes during class times allowing many programs to go ahead. Some of the programs the DDB did in-class include various activity kits created and distributed by the Dream Broker, beading kits created by Shanda Ernest, art kits created by Shawn Piller, People's Cup clay carving project created by SILT studio in Regina and more! Over 175 St. Mary's students have been able to participate in the DDB programs. Unfortunately, the programs have been limited to non-physically active programs to reduce the spread of COVID-19. Because of this, the DDB looked for new ideas for programming and connected with NEWO Wellness an Indigenous based business that promotes well being for all through the teachings of the medicine wheel. They are currently preparing a presentation and care packs for students in Grade 5 & up for St. Mary's students. This program will begin in June 2021.

#### **Connaught School**

The DDB has not been allowed to work in Connaught School this year due to COVID-19 restrictions with the LSKYSD. For the first part of the school year, they prohibited all outside agencies to be in the school and promote any programs through the school. It wasn't until January 2021 that they began allowing the DDB to deliver activity kits to the school and would have Mrs. Humenny, the Community School Family Support Worker, to instruct the students during class time. With the help of Mrs. Humenny, the DDB has been able to send multiple activity kits to over 75 students at Connaught school. The DDB is hoping to be back in Connaught in Fall 2021 where she will be planning after school programs once again.

#### **Summer Camps & Programs**

In August 2020, the DDB was able to help organize a number of day camps for DDB students. There was a cultural, art, soccer & disc golf camp. All took place outdoors and required social distancing. There was great weather and a total of 20 families participated in one or a number of the camps. The DDB also delivered activity kits to families during the Spring & Summer of 2020. These were a huge success. This summer there will be numerous camps offered for students at St. Mary's & Connaught School. Currently, there is a basketball camp, soccer camp, and disc golf camp planned. The DDB is actively looking for more groups to host summer day camps.

**Battlefords KidSport** – The DDB is responsible for accepting paper applications on behalf of KidSport Battlefords. The online applications go straight to KidSport headquarters in Saskatoon. KidSport Battlefords does three fundraisers every year; fundraising and awareness BBQ (brings in about 4% of total fundraising revenue), lobster sales (about 11%), and Operation Red Nose through the Lions Club (about 85%). This year KidSport did not fundraise due to COVID restrictions. Although, they did get a generous donation from Montana's BBQ & Bar for \$2,500.

This year there were far fewer applications submitted due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Parents were either not comfortable registering their children for activities or the sport organization had canceled their programs altogether. With restrictions lifting slightly in March/April, KidSport saw an increase in submissions for Spring activities like soccer, baseball, and gymnastics.

### Volunteering

#### Battlefords District Food & Resource Centre

In Fall 2020 the DDB began volunteering at the Battlefords District Food & Resource Centre (Foodbank) once a week to fill her hours. Since then, the DDB has participated in the Care Pack program that they offer. The program helps students at schools who do not have enough food in their homes to feed the kids during the weekends. The packs include 3 meals for two days as well as snacks to cover them for the days they are away from school. This program will continue into the summer as well in the form of the “after the bell” program through Foodbanks Canada.

#### Meals on Wheels

The DDB has been volunteering with Meals on Wheels since Spring of 2020 to fill hours. The program takes place at lunch hour everyday and the DDB volunteers on Fridays. The program has been a great addition to the DDB’s week and has even allowed her to get vaccinated for COVID-19 as a volunteer with SHA.

**KidSport** – Did you know? Rivers West District currently has 9 KidSport communities. Those committees, comprised entirely by volunteers, assisted 842 children in 2020-2021 to the tune of \$49,923. The top 5 funded sports, across the province, were hockey, soccer, gymnastics, skating, and cheerleading.

The Battlefords – funded 28 kids for a total of \$8,223.

Biggar & Area – funded 15 kids for a total of \$2,668.

Eston – funded 2 kids for a total of \$850.

Kerrobert – funded 3 kids for a total of \$1,220.

Kindersley – funded 11 kids for a total of \$3,875.

Lloydminster – funded 649 kids for a total of \$23,858.

Meadow Lake – funded 20 kids for a total of \$2,301.

Rosetown & Area – funded 100 kids for a total of \$3,417.

Unity – funded 14 kids for a total of \$3,511.

KidSport Saskatchewan – <http://www.kidsportcanada.ca/saskatchewan/> supported 626 kids for a total of \$94,474 in communities that do not have a local KidSport committee.





**Volunteer Recognition Awards** - Our 12<sup>th</sup> Annual Volunteer Recognition Program (VRP) moved forward this year without a banquet to honour the recipients. Recipients were mailed their awards and were highlighted on our social media sites and website. Recognition award plaques were created by Audrey Greves who is a resident of Paradise Hill.

**Mobile Playground Program (MPP)** - Traditionally, Rivers West District ran our Mobile Playground Program each summer, beginning with hiring four Mobile Playground Coordinators to develop and operate the program. This past year, we are unable to run our traditional program. So, we developed a one-time funding opportunity for our member communities and organizations within those communities. Our priority is to have children and youth increase their physical, cultural, and recreational activity.

There were 4 Grant Streams that communities could apply for during the 2020-2021 year:

Stream A: Sport Development

Stream B: Physical Activity & Recreation Development

Stream C: Arts/Culture Development

Stream D: Equipment/Supplies – Sport, Culture & Recreation

During the 2020-2021 program year, there were 23 successful applications for things such as sporting equipment, traditional knowledge sharing, art in the park, soccer equipment, and youth centre programs. Applications came from throughout the District and will impact sport, culture, and recreation programs and services for years to come.

**Saskatchewan Games Program** - The 2020 Saskatchewan Summer Games that were postponed until 2021 were ultimately cancelled in November of 2020. The Host Community in Lloydminster will be given first opportunity to host the 2024 Saskatchewan Summer Games.



At the 2022 Saskatchewan Winter Games in Regina there will be 17 different sports featured. **Coaching Assistance Program** - Rivers West District identified a need to assist coaches in obtaining various levels of coaching certification. In the rural areas of Saskatchewan, it is sometimes a challenge to ensure that a minimum of 10 participants enrol in a NCCP Clinic. Rivers West District developed an assistance program to help coaches offset costs associated with traveling to the larger centres to participate in NCCP clinics and CAAWS workshops not offered in the rural areas. Nineteen of our District coaches took advantage of the Coaching Assistance Program (CAP) to upgrade their coaching certification outside of the District in 2020-2021.

Rivers West District hosted and/or partnered to offer 20 Canadian Women in Sport workshops. Topics included: Effective Communication, Effective Networking, Women on Boards, Leading with Confidence, Conflict Management, Leading the Way (LGBTQI2S Inclusion), Influencing Change, and Life Balance.

### **International Women's Day March 8<sup>th</sup>**

It was rewarding to partner with Prairie Central District on *GRL PWR: Empowered Girls, Empower Girls* Lunch and Learn event. Lara Schroeder, Sparks Solutions, Saskatoon, was both a guest speaker and the moderator for the conversations with Jayden Lawson, Joelle Buckle, Brian Grest and Kaylan Berg. Eight-five attendees, which included four classrooms' students, joined us for a very informative lunch hour.

### **Sport Medicine and Science Council Workshops**

As a collaboration of the Sport Culture and Recreation Districts in the Province, a twelve-month series of workshops was established beginning in January 2021. Interested individuals, no matter where they are located, were welcome to attend sessions of interest. Rivers West District hosted the first sessions, *Injury Prevention and Care*, on January 27<sup>th</sup> with both a Lunch and Learn and evening event. The South West District hosted the February workshops *Concussion Education & Management: Coaches/Parents/Administrators Focused Workshop* Lunch and Learn and there was also an evening workshop. *Concussion Education & Management: Athlete Focus* Lunch and Learn and evening events. Lakeland District was the host for the two sessions on *Optimal Sports Nutrition*.

### **Multicultural Council of Saskatchewan**

Rivers West staff members, along with 50 community members, participated in MCoS's September 19<sup>th</sup> *Walk 2gether Stand 2gether* event in North Battleford. As per the planning notes, "A goal of the event is to attract residents of the city and surrounding areas who are 'non-believers' those who may not embrace multiculturalism and anti-racism practices or are ignorant to it as well as those who are not already actively engaged."

### **Let's Talk Heritage**

Rivers West was one of the Districts that partnered on an online session created by the Saskatchewan Heritage Conservation Branch. The September 23<sup>rd</sup> event's topics, delivered to 51 participants from across the province, included:

- An education/overview on heritage properties including the heritage designation programs and the benefits.
- What designation means and what it does not mean: dispelling common myths and misconception around preservation.
- Community stories – municipal and provincial designations.

**SPRA Enhanced Member Support Initiative** - Through our participation in this initiative we have been afforded the opportunity to enhance our programming and services to our members. The following programs and services are a direct result of our partnership with SPRA on this initiative.

**Community Visitations** - The District continued our community visitations virtually this past year. Rivers West District staff, in coordination with SPRA Field Consultants, plan visits with members in the District who are directly involved with Sport, Culture & Recreation. Visitations took place with the Town of Battleford, Village of Borden, Cut Knife Recreation Board, Town of Kerrobert, Town of Lashburn, and Flying Dust First Nation.

To accomplish these visitations, we employ various methods such as: personal visits by the Rivers West District staff, conducting workshops and clinics in the communities, our participation in committees such as the West Central Municipal Government Committee, and now through our virtual communication tools. We continue to build our extensive community profiles, complete with pictures of facilities and unique features of the community. We have built a strong communication network that informs our members about Rivers West District and our Global partners through these visitations.

**Communities in Bloom Workshop** - On September 28<sup>th</sup>, the District was a partner in the delivery of a *Let's Talk Trees* session with Andrew Exelby, Consultant, Parks and Open Spaces with SPRA (and the provincial Communities in Bloom Coordinator). He discussed how to pick the "right" tree, reviewed key tree species and shared his knowledge and suggestions for proper pruning, planting, and mulching practices with fourteen participants.

**Grant Writing Workshops** - Wendy Plandowski facilitated this training many times during the year - on June 2<sup>nd</sup> (20 attendees), November 30<sup>th</sup> (15 attendees), January 7<sup>th</sup> (16 attendees), January 29<sup>th</sup> (24 attendees), and on March 26<sup>th</sup> (13 in attendance).

**Strategic Planning Tips for Boards** – Glenys Reeves-Gibbs, facilitating was hosted on June 4<sup>th</sup> with 8 attendees.

**Financial Management for Non-Profit Organizations Workshop** - with facilitator, Wendy Plandowski, was hosted on May 26<sup>th</sup> with eight people in attendance.

**Non-Profit Fund-Raising Strategies** – Wendy Plandowski shared her strategies on June 11<sup>th</sup> with 9 people.

**Volunteer Recruitment and Retention** – Wendy Plandowski's knowledge and ideas were shared with six attendees on both June 16<sup>th</sup> and June 18<sup>th</sup>.

**Leading Through Change** - Wendy Plandowski conducted this session on June 23<sup>rd</sup> with 5 in attendance. This 90-minute session addressed ways we can still meet our missions and develop winning change strategies during the pandemic times.

**Running an Effective Board Meeting** – Glenys Reeves-Gibbs, facilitating, was hosted on June 11<sup>th</sup> with 7 attendees.

**Board Governance** – Glenys Reeves-Gibbs, facilitating, was hosted on May 21<sup>st</sup> with 5 attendees.

Strategies for Success for Board Chairs - sessions were popular and Wendy Plandowski conducted six workshops: December 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup>, February 22 and 25<sup>th</sup> and March 29<sup>th</sup> and 31<sup>st</sup>. Sixty individuals learned about being effective Chairs and/or how to support the Chair in preparing for and attending meetings.

Recreation Practitioners Support – *Recreation Practitioners’ meetings/ Friends Around the Table Gathering* - On August 18<sup>th</sup>, and again on September 17<sup>th</sup>, Rivers West District hosted *Things to Do Today for Our Success Tomorrow* virtual workshops with Brenda Robinson (The Robcan Group) facilitating. Brenda presented to an audience of thirty over the two sessions.

Brenda shared her thoughts and ideas on *Working Together in an Intergenerational World* with virtual sessions on November 17<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup>, much to the enjoyment of the twenty-eight people who attended.

Rivers West District invited Brenda to present *Strategies for Building Community Engagement* in three sessions at the end of March. Even with the challenges that the March 29<sup>th</sup> snowstorm offered, a total of thirty-five individuals heard Brenda’s stories and suggestions.

Collaborative Problem Solving - Using the Thomas/Kilmann Conflict Mode Instrument, with a pre-event questionnaire, Glenys Reeves-Gibbs’ July 23<sup>rd</sup> session focused on the five styles for handling conflict- competing, collaborating, compromising, avoiding, and accommodating. The questionnaire’s results provided a basis for participants to identify their most preferred and least preferred style for handling conflict-their conflict comfort zone.
