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Town of Elrose	<p>RM of Monet: There are a number of collaborations including recreation facilities (Uniplex, Recreation Board, Recreation Director, Regional Park, Library) between the Town of Elrose and the RM of Monet and in most cases these are 50-50 partnerships in terms of finance.</p>

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Town of Kindersley	<p>RM of Kindersley: Funding was \$40,000/year (December/2015). The amount of funding from the RM is increasing to \$100,000 in 2016; \$125,000 in 2017 and \$150,000 in 2018. Town of Rosetown	<p>RM of St. Andrews: Rosetown and District Recreation Foundation holds and distributes funds from the member municipalities towards capital recreation projects and facilities in and around the communities. Each municipality pays a membership fee and has a representative on the Foundation; funding decisions are made annually at meeting(s). These funds are not the SLTF-CGP funds. These are over and above that funding. In 2016 the Town and the RM's agreed to continue with this group for another five years 2016-2021.</p> <p>RM of St. Andrews provides funding annually to the Town of Rosetown to off-set costs of operations/maintenance of facilities. (In 2015 – it was noted that there has been a substantial increase in this funding to \$80,000/year and it has been earmarked for the respective facilities i.e. \$/pool, \$/Civic Centre, \$/rink).</p>	RM has 1 rep on the Rosetown & District Recreation Foundation Inc.
